Thank you for your correspondence to the Hon Rob Stokes MP, Minister for Planning and Public Spaces about historic development approvals. The Minister asked me to respond on his behalf.

I note your concerns about the delayed implementation of historical development consents and the compatibility of these consents with current planning standards. I also note your recommendation to carry out regulatory reform to prevent consents from being implemented long after they are approved.

Regarding your request to make regulatory changes, the *Environmental Planning* and Assessment Act 1979 already contains appropriate expiry provisions for development consents. Section 4.53 provides that a development consent lapses after five years unless the consent authority applies a shorter period. During this period, the approved work must be 'physically commenced' on the land. If this has not occurred, the consent lapses and the applicant must lodge a new development application to proceed with the development. Council can investigate and take enforcement action if it is concerned whether physical commencement has occurred.

I understand Council has specific concerns about situations where a development consent has physically commenced but the works are not completed. The Act provides for such situations by enabling councils to issue the owner of the relevant land a development control order to complete the works within a specified time.
